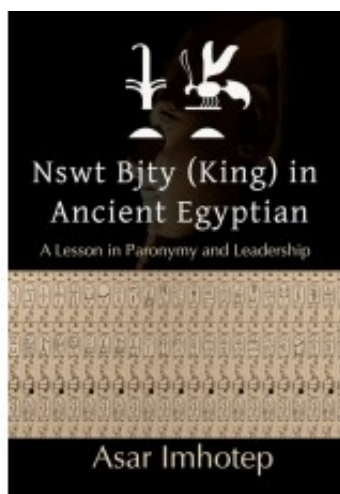


# Nsw.t Bjt.j (King) in Ancient Egyptian
